

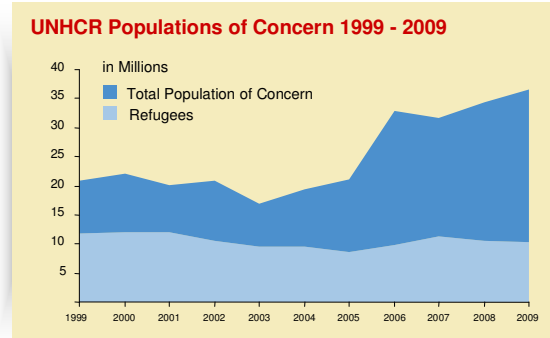


The United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) provides protection and assistance to refugees, asylum-seekers, stateless persons and others of concern under its mandate, which derives from the 1951 Convention Relating to the Status of Refugees and the UN General Assembly. The Office also works to protect those forcibly displaced within the borders of their own States, either directly or together with governments and other partners.

Population Figures

There are more than 43 million uprooted persons worldwide. UNHCR protects and assists more than 36 million, including:

- 10.4 million..... refugees
- 983,000..... asylum-seekers
- 6.6 million..... stateless people
- 15.6 million..... internally displaced persons (IDPs)
- 251,500..... returned refugees
- 2.2 million..... returned IDPs
- 412,000..... others of concern



Finding Durable Solutions*

UNHCR helps refugees and other persons of concern to find durable solutions. Most refugees seek to return to their homes. In 2009, UNHCR assisted 192,000 refugees to return and others to integrate into their country of asylum. However, for a small but important number of refugees, resettlement in a third country where they can rebuild their lives and livelihoods is the only possible solution. The United States is by far the largest resettlement country. Six countries (Australia, Canada, Germany, Norway, Sweden and the United States) took in 93% of the world's resettled refugees in 2009. Despite the generosity of these countries, only a fraction of the 747,000 refugees in need of resettlement in 2010 will find places available.

Origin of Largest Refugee and IDP Groups (under UNHCR mandate)

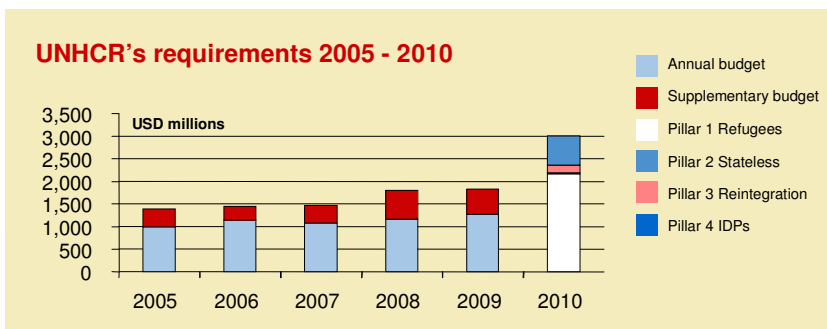

What We Do and Who We Work With:

UNHCR and its partners provide life-saving protection and assistance in the following areas: shelter, water, sanitation, education and health. We actively work on the prevention of SGBV and empowerment of refugees through self-reliance and livelihoods activities, and we tirelessly advocate for the human rights of all persons of concern worldwide. We also distribute non-food items and coordinate with the World Food Programme for food assistance. In 2009, UNHCR had almost 900 national and international partners, which accounted for over \$640 million in expenditure, mostly through non-governmental organizations (NGOs). NGOs accounted for about 35% of UNHCR's expenditures last year.

UNHCR Budget

Starting in 2010, UNHCR has changed the way it presents its funding needs. Instead of planning operations based on the level of anticipated funding, UNHCR now uses a comprehensive needs-based approach to planning and budgeting for all persons of concern. This global assessment of needs yielded a budget of just over \$3 billion for 2010.



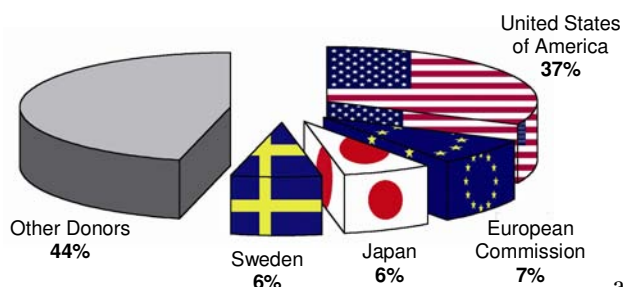
Reform

In addition to its move to needs-based planning and budgeting, since 2006 UNHCR has undertaken significant reforms designed to support results-based management, reduce overhead costs and increase the efficiency of its operations. The proportion of total expenditure dedicated to Headquarters dropped from 14 % in 2006 to 10 % in 2009 with essentially the same number of staff worldwide and 30% fewer in Geneva. During the same period, UNHCR has increased its operations by more than 50%.

Resource Mobilization Update

As of 1 June, UNHCR has raised \$ 138.6 billion. We are almost **\$2 billion short** of what we need in 2010 to meet the basic needs of persons of concern. In the simplest terms, for 2010 UNHCR needs only **25¢ per person per day** to meet the basic needs of those of concern. Without this funding, millions will suffer. For instance, if we do not receive more funding for the Somalia situation (currently only 12% funded) more than 350,000 IDPs will be without shelter; in Kenya, 60,000 new Somali refugees will not receive shelter assistance; in Ethiopia, Somali refugees will remain in overcrowded, unsanitary conditions as construction of a new camp will not commence; and in Djibouti, the water supply in refugee camps will be remain dangerously below acceptable standards.

In Afghanistan/Pakistan (currently 32% funded), there will be a similar situation. Without further funds, repatriation to Afghanistan may halt as UNHCR will be forced to discontinue reintegration and transportation grants. This will prolong the strained situation in Pakistan where medical supplies are low, and security remains a serious challenge.

In Sri Lanka (currently 45% funded), UNHCR has already been forced to discontinue the shelter grant program once this year due to lack of funds. If funds are not forthcoming between 100,000-200,000 IDPs will not receive shelter assistance.
