Refugees and asylum seekers are left in limbo, languishing at borders waiting for welcome. Many have been displaced by economic conditions, war and climate change. Among the millions of refugees are families looking for safe places that they can call home.

In the midst of these despairing moments, the United Church of Christ is able to offer hope as we stand in solidarity and mutuality with communities suffering and in need. Through Wider Church Ministries, the United Church of Christ fulfills its commitment to respond to a variety of global and local concerns by providing advocacy, sustainable development resources, long term disaster recovery support, and assistance for refugee and asylum seekers, working in collaboration with our partners locally and globally.

Sandra, a Congolese refugee, was welcomed and resettled in 2018. She is one of more than a dozen refugee women using skills she learned in RefugeeOne's Sewing Studio to make face masks as a way of giving back to the place she now calls home.

- During worship, share stories and videos you can download for free. Templates are available that you can easily paste into your presentation. Your members may be excited to learn more about what their gifts make possible.
- ▶ Thank everyone for participating in the offering. You may want to announce how much was raised. If you set a goal, create a slide to show everyone whether you reached it, or if there is a little way to go. - ▶ Donations should be mailed to your UCC Conference Office, check https://www.ucc.org/about-us_conference for address. Please clearly mark that the gift is for the OGHS Offering (Immediate Spending) or OGHS Endowment Fund (Legacy Gifts).



In addition to Our Church's Wider Mission (Basic Support), the United Church of Christ has 4 Special Mission Offerings (SMOs). These offerings exist to allow congregations and individuals to meet people at points of critical need in their lives. Though many options exist for direct, individual support of these needs, the SMOs allow a common witness and make a collective positive impact. Our church has identified four areas where these critical human needs exist:

- One Great Hour of Sharing—in places lacking health and educational resources and/or where disaster has struck;
- Neighbors in Need—within systems of injustice which oppress daily life and opportunity;
- Strengthen the Church—in the nurture of youth and congregations just beginning their lives of faith;
- ➤ The Christmas Fund—in the lives of church leaders without sufficient resources to live with dignity;

We believe these SMOs collectively serve to lift people closer to the abundance and wholeness to which Jesus Christ has called us to work together to bring about. Theme Interpretation

During the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic, it became clear that many of the western world constructs intended to create a sense of safety had actually created a false sense of security. In a global crisis, we were faced with a danger that defied our usual protective hedges. While some were made more vulnerable by economic and geographical factors, everyone was affected by the virus.

As it turns out, lines on a map don't stop the spread of disease; a pandemic does not recognize human-made

boundaries. Whether we like it or not, our lives are deeply intertwined. Our well-being is bound, inextricably, to that of neighbors close to home, and those halfway around the world.

The sooner we recognize that human codependency, the better we are able to *let love flow*—generously and indiscriminately—to those who need it most.

When water comes to a village, everything changes. It touches every area of life—literally and figuratively! Having clean water closeby means that women in Nicaragua don't have to spend their whole day walking to the source, so they might have other opportunities for learning or vocational growth. Children in Kenya no longer spend their days carrying heavy buckets, so they can go to school instead.

Improved sanitation slows the spread of disease, so there is less preventable illness. Crops thrive in Vietnam, meaning that food security and nutrition improve in the whole community. Families can spend more time together. People of all ages around the world are empowered to provide for their families today, while also planning for the future of their communities.

Let love flow

Isaiah 49:8-12 articulates a stunning vision for a world of justice and equity; a world where everyone has enough, and all live in safety and abundance. It is also a vision for a world of *interconnectedness*. In this vision, what is good for you is also good for your neighbor; what is good for one country is good for the whole world; and what harms any one of us harms us all.



That Kingdom kind of vision runs through the work that we share in together through One Great Hour of Sharing—much like the stream that runs through Isaiah's Kingdom vision. Human-made constructs of one sort or another too often hinder human thriving, shoring up resources for some while leaving many to suffer. A world built on that sort of imbalance is counter to God's dream for creation.

In order to help bring about that more just, abundant vision for humanity, One Great Hour of Sharing supports projects around the world that create opportunity and empower communities. Through global partnerships, your offerings promote food security; enable health and wellness programs; support education and vocational training; and of course—provide access to clean, safe water.

Water, after all, is life.

In many ways, our world was not prepared for the weight of the COVID-19 pandemic. But because of your past generosity through One Great Hour of Sharing, many communities were better prepared to meet the challenges presented by COVID-19. Through the projects that you've supported in the past, more people were equipped for the crisis with improved sanitation; access to clean, safe water for handwashing; and were empowered to prevent the spread of disease among their family and neighbors.

And when you continue to give generously, you continue to give life—in the form of water and so much more—to people in need around the world. You continue to build on the dream of a world in which there is no thirst, no hunger, no suffering... just the abundance of life in a living stream.

But you aren't just sharing water. . . when you share what God has given, you "*let love flow*." That love crosses all sorts of spaces and dividing lines, knitting together a better human story, and bringing the Kingdom of God about in our time.

When you give to One Great Hour of Sharing, you support water and other sustainable development projects all over the world. When you "*let love flow*," lives are not just saved—they are transformed.

Nobody hungry, nobody thirsty, shade from the sun, shelter from the wind, For the Compassionate One guides them, takes them to the best springs.

Sermon Starter

Picture your church's mission impact as a stream. Where does it go? What path does it take as you commission members, resources and the embodied words of the gospel to go out into the world? Whose lives are touched by that stream?

In Isaiah, God says "I'll make all my mountains into roads, turn them into a superhighway." How does the mission stream that flows from your congregation shape the landscape as it makes its path through the world?

The people of Israel found themselves exiles in a strange land when Jerusalem was conquered by Babylon. Now, the Babylonians themselves have been conquered by Persia and Cyrus the Great. The prophet speaks to the people after Babylon has fallen (sometime around 586–539 BCE). On the surface, it is a heavy time of war, poverty and devastation.

But in spite of that devastation, it is also a time of restoration. This new generation of wanderers might be allowed, finally, to return home; to reclaim their land, rebuild their homes, even restore their Temple. All the while, the prophet assures Israel that their covenant with God has never been broken—even as their structures and institutions crumbled, God remained with the people.

One critical part of that covenant is that *Israel's responsibilities* extend beyond its own people—God has called them to care more widely for the nations of the earth; to show compassion and mercy as an expression of covenant living.² This was part of their identity as God's people before the exile, and remains true at their core as they move into a season of renewal. Even—maybe especially—in a time of upheaval, they are called to be people who live outside of themselves.

Isaiah 49:10 conveys a powerful vision for creation; it's a vision that will be brought to life by these people of covenant and restoration. To be in covenant means to be "a powerful agent and partner in the practice of loyal solidarity that makes a new future possible.3" In this moment, God is inviting them to step into their role as a community that will *let love flow* in new and innovative ways.

Folk-country supergroup "The Highwomen" released their album by the same name in fall of 2019. But one of the album's tunes took on new life in the early weeks of the COVID-19 crisis. "A Crowded Table" emerged as an anthem of the social-distancing era. You may have even seen it on a Campbell's soup commercial! One verse goes:

If we want a garden, we're gonna have to sow the seed Plant a little happiness, let the roots run deep; If it's love that we give, then it's love that we reap If we want a garden, we're gonna have to sow the seed...⁴

That's the same Kingdom kind of vision at the heart of the text; a world in which "everyone's a little broken, but everyone belongs. . .," as one line of the song's bridge affirms. Covenant people are those who recognize that love is what we reap—but only if we first sow it. Only if we release it from our grasp, sending it out to transform the world around us.

When you give generously through OGHS, you *let love flow*. You empower families and communities around the world to live healthier, safer, more hope-filled lives. And ultimately, you build a world that honors the interconnectedness of all God's people.

In this time when all of life has been touched by the effects of the pandemic, we are called to be people of restoration; releasing love into the world in new and innovative ways that answer the unique needs of this season. As the body of Christ in the world, the Church of today puts flesh on this vision: a world shaped by love's movement from one place to another.

The Body of Christ today transforms everything it touches—much like the body of water at the heart of Isaiah's vision for humankind. So take your congregation on a journey downstream: maybe with pictures; maybe using visualization; maybe even setting up worship stations to explore different expressions of mission life. Dive into questions—maybe even celebrations!—about your collective impact. Start with lives inside your own congregation, then look at your local community. And then—follow that stream all the way to Nicaragua; to Kenya; to Vietnam, and all of the other places where your One Great Hour of Sharing gifts are at work.

You are part of a living stream that changes lives as water reaches all who are thirsty.

If your church is a body of water, where does it go? Who does it touch? How does it carve a path and change the shape of the world it flows through?

Of course, every body of water has one thing in common: a source. That source is not your sanctuary, your fellowship hall, or your charter. It is the love of God, made known in Christ and community. When you unleash that power and let love flow, miraculous things happen in the wake of that stream. What stories of new life might be possible when the gifts of your members are set on a course to flow through the world?

Litany

Using photos or videos of bodies of water near and familiar to your congregation will give depth and power to the meditation.

All: Wearing away the stone to let love flow!

One: Joining in a murmur of praise, the stream unites ...

One: From the banks of hillside creeks and the streams that irrigate our fields, may our love converge

All: In a mighty river of mercy to let love flow!

One: For this we know: drops alone may dry too soon, but drops together are a flood of love!

All: In this and every hour: Let Love Flow!


Invitation to Communion

Imagine all the obstacles farmers face to get their crops to harvest, and then to market. Then, imagine all these things happening—at once.

In Nicaragua families find it harder to believe that there will come a day when they do not hunger or thirst. For many, food security can seem like an unattainable goal. But through a partnership with many organizations such as: Growing Hope Globally, a respected local organization CIEETS, and Church World Service, the United Church of Christ is helping families to thrive despite such adversity.

René Bermúdez is working hard to ensure that his family has enough to eat and he has a way to earn a living. René is raising stingless Melipona bees, which produce medicinal honey that he can sell. Through the program, he learned about poultry raising and has started raising chickens—and now has forty hens that produce eggs, plus another 140 that he is preparing to sell!

Like René, several of the families there have lost several harvests to the effects of climate change. Farmers in their community found that when it rains too much, the crops die from disease or are washed away. When it doesn't rain enough, they dry up. Either way, farmers lose everything.

This situation is all too common in many places in rural Vietnam and across southeast Asia.

In September of 2018, latrine and water supply improvements were brought to Hanh's school. Since then, Hanh and her friends have had an exciting time experiencing modern latrines and clean water taps. . . and how these conveniences lead to better hygiene and, ultimately, better health.

California church cares for newcomers

Six days a week, the kitchen at Eden United Church of Christ in Hayward, Calif., is bustling. Volunteer cooks—primarily asylum-seeking mothers from Mexico and Central America—are using their favorite recipes to prepare hot meals.

The meals are delivered late afternoon to 100 newcomers attending the local public schools and their caregivers. The asylum-seeking youth and their family members who receive food may be living in households under quarantine or in isolation, because someone is recovering from COVID-19 at home.

Many adults being served by Eden's meal program were working one or more low-wage jobs to cover basic necessities. They lost that work due to the pandemic. Children enrolled in public schools can access free breakfasts and lunches, "but what about dinner, the weekends, school vacations, and what about their families?" asked the Rev. Arlene Nehring, the congregation's pastor.

To help Eden provide meals, UCC Disaster Ministries provided a small grant from its COVID-19 Refugee and Asylum Fund to purchase groceries for the hot meal program.

Nehring said the UCC grant would cover hot meals for 100 people for two weeks.

"The real story," Nehring said, "is that these immigrant women are volunteering while suffering from the pandemic themselves, giving substantial time and talent to take care of others in more difficult circumstances. They are knocking themselves out for others," including "kids they've never met."

Micaela Serrano Cuevas, a native of Mexico, is the executive chef for UIY Hot Meals, and a popular cook at a local restaurant. She was furloughed because of the pandemic and was therefore able to immediately step in at Eden to help produce a large volume of delicious meals, assure food safety, and provide coaching to others who didn't have much experience cooking in large quantities. She also enlisted her niece, a pastry chef, and her two young-adult daughters.

"Migrant women are so demeaned in U.S. culture," Nehring observed. "At Eden, by contrast, we honor their skills and compassion for strangers."

The congregation has forged a deep relationship with its immigrant neighbors over the past 20 years, the pastor said. Today the neighborhood is 65 to 70 percent first-generation Mexican, primarily people from the farming states that stretch from Guadalajara to the Gulf of Mexico, just above Mexico City.

"With COVID-19, everything is harder for newcomers," Nehring said. "Their legal cases are on hold. They cannot get a Social Security number until they go to court. They are not eligible for employment without a Social Security number. They cannot get a driver's license. They are supposed to prove their children are enrolled in school and attend. So how exactly are they supposed to pay for food and rent?"

Accompanying asylum seekers is "a marathon experience, not a sprint," Nehring said. "Our experience illustrates why we need meaningful immigration reform. Meanwhile we try to figure out the next best thing to do with the resources we have."

Dry conditions fuel fires, devastation

From January 1 to November 3, 2020 there were 47,506 wildfires compared with 44,929 wildfires in the same period in 2019, according to the National Interagency Fire Center. About 8.6 million acres were burned in the 2020 period, compared with 4.6 million acres in 2019. Six of the top 20 largest California wildfires fires occurred in 2020, according to CalFire's list.

In August, a series of lightning strikes started hundreds of fires across Northern California. Dubbed the August Complex fire, they are the largest fire in California's history, burning 1.03 million acres in six counties and continuing into November.

On September 28, a state of emergency was declared in California in response to the wildfires that burned through Napa, Sonoma and Shasta Counties, where tens of thousands were forced to evacuate.

In early October, 65 large fires were burning in California, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington and five other states, consuming over 2 million acres. In Oregon

thousands of residents evacuated their homes to escape the flames that scorched more than 230,000 acres. In California fires burned from the north all the way down to the Mexican border, stretching across approximately 800 miles of landscape. In Washington, more acres had been burned in 2020 than in the past 12 fire seasons. The fires are being fueled by continuing dry conditions.


In response to all the fires, in the midst of the COVID-19 Pandemic, the United Church of Christ was barely able to provide any support to the Conferences and Communities impacted. Of course, the church and its leaders prayed, asked others to pray, but we also kept checking in to

let our colleagues know of our care.

In Oregon, UCC Disaster Ministries walked with leaders in the Conference as they began their response and learned to work in the community. Our team introduced them to key people in the disaster field who could help the Central Pacific Conference, who had not experienced this level of disaster in recent history.

With a newly formed disaster recovery team, the Conference was engaged in support to all of its congregations on a regular basis. With 17 UCC Churches directly impacted, supported was provided for members, community organizations that assist the migrant and homeless population, and many who were displaced. Several families lost everything in their homes.

With so much loss in Oregon, UCC provided an initial grant of \$20,000 and is gearing up for the long-term recovery process when the time is right. Continued gifts to the West Coast Wildfires are appreciated.

How Far Will You Go to Let Love Flow?

How far are you willing to go so that your family will not thirst? For Namanu Macharia, that distance was twelve miles. Twelve miles of walking with her children; twelve miles of the heat beating down on them; twelve miles of carrying empty five-gallon containers to retrieve water, then rolling those containers back to her home.

The prophet Isaiah declares that God's people will neither hunger nor thirst. But for those living near Merille, in Kenya's Marsabit County, hunger and thirst were a daily concern as water scarcity is a huge problem in this arid desert region. Obtaining water was once a crippling daily challenge, especially for the women and children responsible for walking long distances in search of streams and ponds. Even when they found precious sources, the water they brought home was contaminated, often making their families sick. Between illness and the sheer amount of time it took every day to find water, families were caught in a vicious cycle of increasing hunger and poverty.

That was the situation until our partners and the community drilled a solar-powered borehole well and installed a water system.

Water kiosks like the one in Merille function like small shops, where people pay a modest fee for clean water. That money covers the operating and maintenance costs of the water system, ensuring it will be around for a long time to come, and available whenever they need water. In addition to the 2,850 community members who use the kiosk, it also serves two schools, the local livestock market, and a health center which serves more than 4,800 people!

Namanu still walks from her home to retrieve water, but now, the entire journey is less than one-third mile to the kiosk and back. "I can leave my food cooking, fetch water, and be back on time," she says. The new water system in Merille is a huge step forward in the fight against hunger, illness, and poverty in the area. For Namanu and thousands of her neighbors, it means freedom and peace of mind.

How far are you willing to go so that people in waterscarce regions no longer need to walk twelve miles to receive God's promise of a life without hunger or thirst? The journey begins with One Great Hour of Sharing. Your generous gift supports life giving water. Let your love flow.
